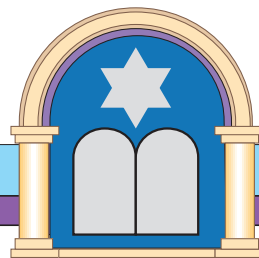

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FROM THE PRESIDENT

During the holidays, God chooses who among us will be written and sealed in the Book of Life and who will not. Theoretically, our own choices, our attentiveness to mitzvot and our aversion to sin, are part of God's equation.

As we read in parasha Re'eh, God tells the Israelites to go to one mountain for blessings and another mountain for curses, as if choosing the right path was as straightforward, as binary, as opting for either Door #1 or Door #2. I'm not sure that life—or human nature—is so simple. Certainly the choices that we face every day are not so simple, the choices about how to behave, or what will make us happy.

Good things happen; bad things happen. People are lucky or unlucky and sometimes, it looks like they make or change their own luck. Some people manage to be happy even after tragedy; others who seem very lucky are clearly unhappy nonetheless.

Viktor Frankl was a psychologist who survived the concentration camps and created the practice of logotherapy. In extremely simplified form, he said that we find meaning in life in three ways. The first is by taking action, because taking action helps us feel that what we do or say matters; the second is by experiencing something good or beautiful, whether it is a work of art or finding something to admire in another human being, because even when we can't control events we can appreciate the goodness that exists. The third, and perhaps the most difficult, way even when we cannot take action or find something to appreciate, is to meet suffering courageously, and choose how to experience it.

Taking action, appreciating the goodness and beauty in others and in the world, and deciding explicitly how to characterize our experiences. Sounds almost as if, whichever path you chose, whether you chose Door #1 or Door #2, you could make it be the best possible door under the circumstances. The way we define our experiences defines us.

Abraham Lincoln, who was not only a great statesman but also a known depressive, said, "Most people are about as happy as they make up their minds to be." With this new year underway, I hope we can make up our minds to be happy. I hope we can choose the right path, the path of meaning; take action to make the change we wish to see in the world; be grateful for the beauty and goodness that is already here; and face any difficulties with courage; so that when we look back at our choices, we understand just how lucky we are.

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

RABBI ANDREW WARMFLASH



Some time ago I spied a striking message on the back of a passing car. Rather than advocating support for a political candidate or boasting about a child's status as an honor student, it consisted of three simple words: DON'T POSTPONE JOY!

The bumper sticker's message is fundamental in our Jewish tradition. The psalmist urges us "Serve God in Joy," and the Jerusalem Talmud teaches that we will have to give an accounting in the next world for all the legitimate pleasures of this world that we fail to enjoy.

Joy is central to Judaism. But all too often, we fail to take the mitzvah of rejoicing as seriously as we should. I have often wondered why some people who are scrupulous in observing the rituals of Jewish mourning are far less observant when it comes to the mitzvah of rejoicing. It is certainly important to honor the memory of our departed by reciting Kaddish and saying Yizkor, but to do so without delighting in Shabbat and the other Jewish holidays is to risk turning our vibrant, joyous, life-affirming faith into little more than a series of somber occasions to express our sorrow.

The holidays of Sukkot and Simchat Torah together form the climax of the fall holiday season. Together they are known as "zeman simchatainu—the time of our rejoicing." These holidays afford us the opportunities to sit with friends and family in the sukkah, eating delicious food and enjoying the bounty of the season; and to sing, dance and rejoice in the Torah, God's greatest gift to us and all humanity. For those of us with children and grandchildren, Sukkot and Simchat Torah also provide a perfect way to model the joy of Jewish living and to create indelible memories that will last a lifetime.

This year Sukkot begins on Monday night, October 13. Simchat Torah is celebrated on Tuesday night, October 21 and Wednesday, October 22.

Don't postpone joy! October is filled with opportunities for rejoicing. Let's grab them all.

I look forward to sitting with you in the sukkah and dancing with you on Simchat Torah.

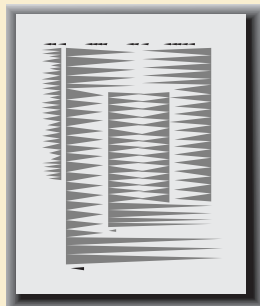

Greetings everyone and Chag Sameach! It is hard to believe that this year begins my third year as Cantor of our congregation. I would like to thank everyone in advance for making this High Holiday Season successful. Thank you to all the staff and to my High Holiday Choir who has been working so hard all year. Thank you to everyone who will be reading Torah for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

As the festival of Sukkot begins, I would like to tell a little story about a little girl, who was ambitious, and very determined. . .

As the fall was approaching and the wind began to roar, the smell of pumpkins and squash were in the air. Leaves were starting to change color on the trees. Summer had clearly passed. This little girl knew that at this time of year, as the season was changing, something was changing inside of her.

She asked her mother that summer if they could start having chicken and challah on Friday night and if she could light the Shabbat candles.

As the season began to change to fall, she wanted to change too. She began giving tzedakah to people who were in need. Every morning she put some money in a tzedakah box she made in Religious School. She started helping around the house and started listening to her parents more. She started saying sorry to all the people she had been mean to this passed year.

As the season began to change to fall, something happened! It started to rain! She was scared because there was a hurricane coming. Her family taped up all the windows, and they hid in the basement until the storm cleared.

Their house was still standing, and she thanked God. All around her yard were branches and leaves. The festival of Sukkot was only a few days away. She remembered what she had learned in Religious School that the Sukkah, though a temporary dwelling, was a place where she and her family could be protected by God. God had saved her from a horrible storm, a hurricane, and now this little girl wanted to celebrate God's shelter for eight days by building her very own Sukkah.

So the little girl, as the season began to change collected branches and pine cones and pine leaves. This little girl built four walls and tied them together. And with the pine tree branches, and pine cones she decorated her Sukkah. She then drew pictures and hung them all around, and stapled chains together which draped from high above, from the roof of her Sukkah.

This little girl thanked God again. She was so happy that she was able to build something so beautiful. On the first night of Sukkot she and her family ate in their Sukkah for the first time. Together they said a blessing, the shehecheyanu; thanking God for sustaining them and allowing them to reach this special day. They ate in that Sukkah for eight special days. Every time the little girl looked around she knew she had done something so special and so proud. Next year the little girl built another Sukkah, and her family has been building a Sukkah every Festival of Sukkot since then.

May you all have a wonderful Festival of Sukkot! Chag Sameach from your Cantor (the little girl in the Sukkah Story) and my children, David Zachary and Zamira Renee.

I am actually writing this article on Labor Day because I would personally like to commend the unsung heroes who work behind the scenes to keep our building and office functioning.

Helaine Ronen, our Office Manager of 18 years, keeps our yearly Synagogue calendar, prepares the tickets for the High Holy Days as well as numerous other tasks. She gathers the information for Hakol and makes sure it always goes out on time. Need a leaf on our Tree of Life? Call Helaine.

Without Betsy Kass, our Administrative Assistant, we would have no cake or food for Shabbat Kiddush (what could be more important!) or butter, cream cheese, juice and bagels for Rabbi's classes. She is usually the first contact in the event of a simcha or a tragedy in your family. Need a fob? Ask Betsy.

Eva Kobloth, our bookkeeper of less than a year, deposits your checks and credit card payments and sees to it that our bills are paid on time. She also has the unenviable task of reminding those members behind in their dues to please pay!

All three answer your calls with questions from members, non-members as well as assisting the Religious School, Nursery and Youth Group.

James Reynolds, our Head Custodian and his staff are second to none. James knows every inch of this building and is a carpenter, electrician and machinist all rolled into one. Need something fixed? Call James. Since he spends much time in the Nursery School, the children all know his name and greet him when they see him.

Tanea Reynolds has been working here for 10 years and knows many of our members and their children by name. As part of her job, she supervises the Shabbat Kiddush, keeps inventory of the food and even picks up the bagels for Shabbat.

Bob Barr makes sure all the classrooms are clean and that rooms are set up for all meetings and is always patient when those meetings run late.

Jarrel Venable takes care of custodial problems in the Nursery School (sometimes messy ones), but always has a huge smile on his face!

In addition to his custodial duties, Jamie (Jimmy) Zambria arrives before 7:00 am each morning to prepare the coffee for our morning Minyanaires.

Our hard working custodians keep our 60,000 square foot facility clean, warm (or cool) and spent their "summer vacation" sprucing up the outside of the building as well as painting the gym, power washing the outside fence, polishing the floors, and setting up for the High Holy days.

This is a service business and we bend over backwards for our "customers." We know our congregants have a choice of synagogues, and we strive to provide an environment where they will want to belong. Our members, board and staff form a sacred congregational partnership that works best because we have common goals, trust, communication and respect. 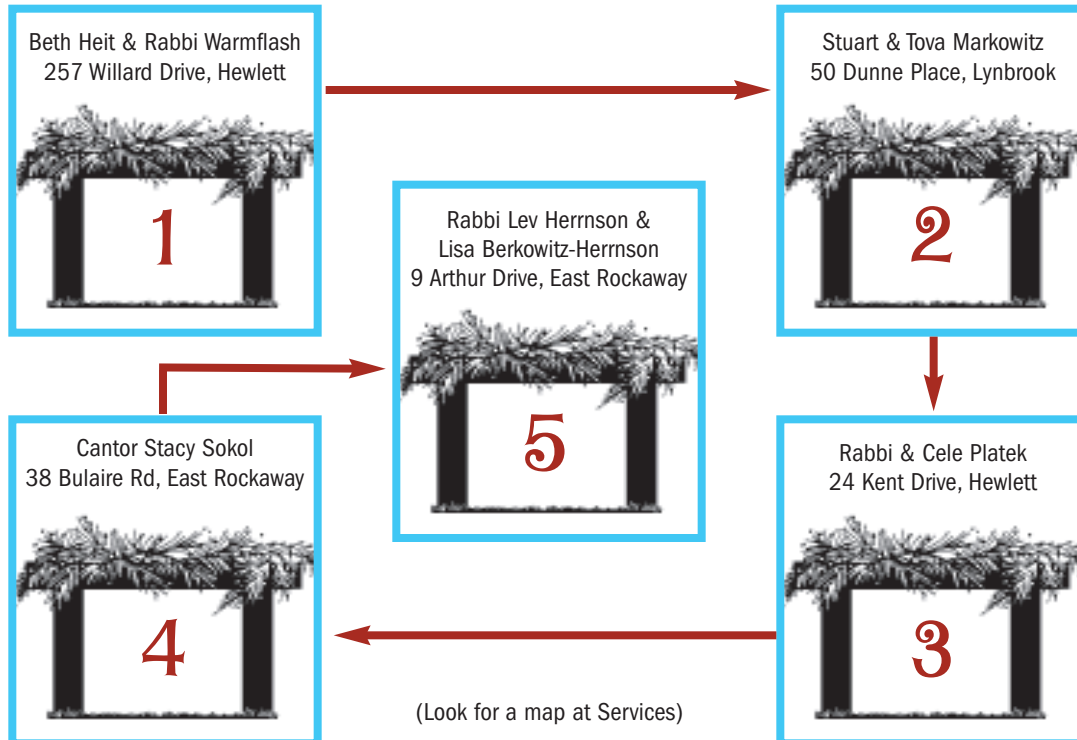

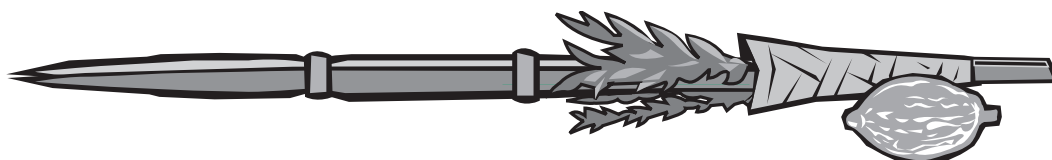

TO FEEL THE JOY OF SUKKOT

While rejoicing is enjoined for all festivals, in the case of Sukkot an extra measure of enjoyment was prescribed: "And thou shalt rejoice in thy festival ... and thou shalt be altogether joyful" (Deut. 16:14-16).

"Why do the children of Israel make a Sukkah? For the miracles that God wrought for them when they went out of Egypt, surrounding them with clouds of glory and shielding them, as it is said: 'For I make the children of Israel dwell in booths' (Lev.23:43). The Holy One, blessed be He, said to them: 'My children, make ye booths and dwell in them seven days that ye may be reminded of the

miracles I wrought for you in the desert' " (*Pesiqta deRav Kahana*).

"The Sukkah is designed to warn us that man is not to put his trust in the size or strength or beauty of his home, though it be filled with all precious things; nor must he rely upon the help of any human being, however powerful. But let him put his trust in the great God whose word called the universe into being, for He alone is mighty, and His promises alone are sure" (Isaac Aboab, *Menorat Hama'or*).

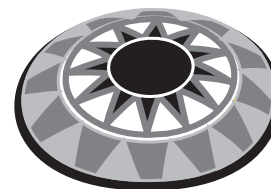

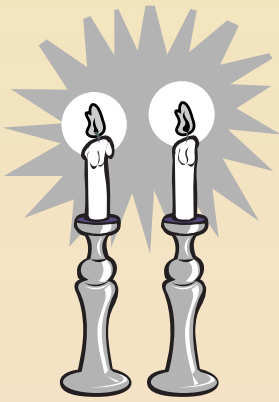

NURSERY SCHOOL

What do mass murderers, felony drunk drivers, starving children, head banging laboratory animals, anxious, overworked students, and reptiles have in common? They don't play. What do most Nobel Laureates, historically renowned creative artists, successful multi-career entrepreneurs, and animals of superior intelligence have in common? They are full of play throughout their lives.

Most of us do not spend much time pondering the subject of play or consider it as basic as say, oxygen or sleep. Hold your breath for 45 seconds and your body will scream for air. Stay awake for two full days and every cell will ache for sleep. When an adult misses play for a few days about all that seems to happen is that life loses its brightness and sense of purpose. But be seriously deprived of play in childhood and the consequences are likely to be dire, though delayed.

Every child engages in spontaneous play. From the first moments of post feeding nipple play, to the shared babbling between parent and child, to peek-a-boo and ring around the rosy, any healthy child is energized by and finds its waking hours dominated by play. Snow leopards box, sea lions play tug of war, killer whales tease sea gulls and wolves play with each other. And humans? Well, we are the champions of play, designed by biology for play through all of our lives, but sculpted by culture as to its adult forms.

Play and games seem necessary for the development of community which requires mutual trust, cooperation, and common goal setting. For humans, play is also surprisingly active in the shaping of one's own sense of self, and thus is directly related to mental health and elasticity. It is also the means by which we shape a model world.

The growing virtual world, which is now often being seen as the only reality in which we exist, is at base, a

play-imaginary world.

Witness a monkey leaping and pirouetting gleefully from a tree into a pond while looking at peers and play can be seen as art in action. So, it appears that nature has provided us options we do not always appreciate or incorporate into our lives. Perhaps the time has come for us to allow its wisdom to be enacted.

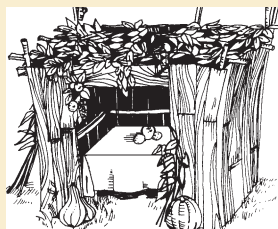

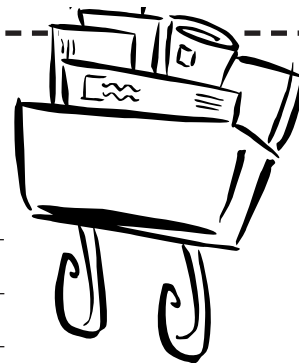
