The Rabbi's Remarks

Rekindling the Menorah, Rekindling Community

When the Maccabees defeated the Greeks and recovered the Temple in Jerusalem, their first instinct was not to celebrate their military victory, nor to secure their political power. They understood that the most urgent thing to do was to reestablish the life of the community. The Temple had been desecrated, the people traumatized, the very rhythms of Jewish life interrupted. And so they turned their attention

to the sacred Menorah. By rekindling its light, they symbolized the rebirth of their people, the recentering of their identity, and the restoration of their connection to God.

Chanukah, therefore, is not only about the miraculous oil that lasted eight days. It is about the determination of a people to prioritize spiritual life even in the shadow of war and destruction. It is about the courage to believe that a small flame can push away great darkness. It is about the insight that community is what sustains us long after the battles are fought.

We too face challenges in our own day. As I write this article, the war in Gaza continues. Forty-eight Israeli hostages remain in captivity. Israelis and Palestinians alike are paying an unbearably high price for a conflict that has already lasted two years. Here in the United States and abroad, we are also confronting a rise in antisemitism that threatens not only our safety, but also our confidence in the future.

And yet, just as in the days of the Maccabees, our task is clear. External threats may sometimes be overcome, or at least controlled. But the most important question is: what kind of community will we be when the fighting quiets down? What inner strength will we have cultivated so that we can endure? What kind of Jewish home will we pass on to our children?

The answer lies in the Menorah. Just as our ancestors prepared oil to keep its flame alive, so too must we prepare the "oil" that sustains our Jewish life today. That oil is made of many things: our presence in synagogue life, our knowledge and learning, our generosity of spirit and resources, our commitment to one another, and our willingness to come together in joy and in sorrow. Without these elements, the Menorah cannot remain lit. With them, it shines brightly against the darkness.

This Chanukah, as we gather to kindle the candles, we are invited to reflect on our role in keeping that flame alive. Lighting the menorah is not only a ritual—it is a declaration that we believe in the future of the Jewish people. Every flame we add each night is a reminder that our strength grows when we gather together.

At HERJC, we are blessed with a community that is resilient, diverse, and dedicated. Let us continue to strengthen it—with our time, our energy, our knowledge, and our financial support. Each of us has the ability to add oil to the lamp. Each of us has the ability to ensure that the light of Torah, tradition, and togetherness continues to shine here on the South Shore of Long Island and beyond.

May this Chanukah inspire us to be builders of community, guardians of hope, and keepers of the flame. And may we merit the day when the Menorah of our tradition becomes also the Menorah of Shalom—a light of peace for Israel, for the Jewish people, and for the entire world. *Chag Urim Sameach*—may the Festival of Lights bring joy and strength to you and your loved ones.

Our community is passionate about Judaism, giving, and thoughtfully working towards a continual, *hopeful* and meaningful future!

I am fortified by this hopefulness, which goes hand in hand with *chesed* (kindness). Just ask my children. While it is still a work in progress, focusing on kindness has become a bit of a joke in our family; we constantly ask each other, "Are you being kind?" Thank you to everyone who joined us for the High Holidays and the Chagim that followed—we hope that it was a meaningful experience for all. So many congregants participated in services, and I'm happy to say that a majority of the Torah readings during Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur were done by our teenagers. We also had some of our younger members leading us in parts of the services. And I think that this was our biggest crowd for Yom Kippur mincha and Neilah in many years. The congregational break fast after Yom Kippur was also a big hit and we hope that it can continue—after all, eating is a big part of Jewish ritual!

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This year, we are organizing a series of Shabbat morning services to be led by various HERJC committees. If you're on a committee, please volunteer to do your part to help lead. We are also having a L'dor Vador (from generation to generation) Shabbat where we invite kids, their parents, and their grandparents to participate and lead the service together. This service is also scheduled for March, but if you are interested in having your family be a part, don't hesitate to contact me, the clergy, or the office soon. You don't have to read Torah or lead a prayer (although that would be great!)—just opening and closing the ark could be a beautiful family moment. Chanukah Treats

Charcuterie boards are very trendy! How about adding a Latke Board to your holiday table?

Celebrate Chanukah with a latke board that's customized with all your favorite trimmings. The latkes go fast so we suggest adding some sturdy kettle chips as a backup potato option. If you plan on making the latkes right before serving, you'll want to assemble the board ingredients first, keeping perishables like smoked fish refrigerated, then fry the latkes, place everything on the board and serve.

Additional Topping Suggestions: Smoked fish, dips such as sour cream, creme fraiche, hummus, guacamole, tzatziki, pickled vegetables, hard boiled eggs, garnishes.

Latkes Ingredients:

Vegetable oil, for frying 3-1/2 lbs. russet potatoes, peeled 1 large onion, quartered 3 large eggs, beaten 3/4 cup matzo meal Kosher salt 3/4 teaspoon baking powder



Use a 1/4-cup measure to scoop the potato mixture onto the skillets leaving room between each. Gently press each with a spatula to flatten, being careful not to spatter oil. Cook until the undersides are deep golden and crispy, about 2 minutes. Flip and cook the second side, 2 minutes more. Transfer to a baking sheets and place in the oven while you make more latkes, adding more oil to the skillet as needed. Towards the bottom of the bowl will be more liquid from the potatoes; press the liquid out when you scoop the potatoes so the oil doesn't spatter and the latkes stay crisp. (Makes about 36 small latkes.)



This summer, I had the privilege of traveling to Iceland, a land full of contrasts—glaciers standing beside volcanoes, roaring waterfalls flowing into quiet valleys, and skies that stretched so wide it felt

as though they could embrace the earth. Everywhere I turned, I was reminded of how vast, beautiful, and mysterious our world truly is.

As I walked through those breathtaking landscapes, I often thought about the journeys our children are on each day here in our ECC. For them, a new school year can feel like stepping into a new country—exciting, a little uncertain, and full of possibilities. At first, there may be tears or hesitation, just as there are when we enter unfamiliar places. But with time, patience, and courage, the children begin to settle in, and suddenly the world opens up with laughter, friendships, and joy.

One of the lessons I carried home from Iceland is the importance of noticing wonder in everyday moments. Like the journeys described in our tradition, life is filled with challenges and joys, but what matters most is that we travel it together—with love, with trust, and with gratitude.

And as Chanukah approaches, we are reminded that even the smallest light can brighten the darkest night. Just as the Maccabees rededicated the Temple with courage and hope, we too can bring light into our homes, classrooms, and community through acts of kindness, joy and gratitude.

Thank you for allowing us to share in this part of your children's journey. May this season be one of warmth, connection, and appreciation for the blessings all around us.



Torah Mantle Campaign



Jeanette Kuvin Oren is the most frequently commissioned Judaic artist in the United States. Since 1984, she has worked with more than 400 synagogues and community organizations worldwide.



It is with tremendous excitement and gratitude that we share information about our Torah Mantle Campaign. As was announced on Yom Kippur, HERJC is embarking on a campaign to add beauty and meaning to our Main Sanctuary and Chapel. We are working with Jeanette Kuven Oren, a gifted Judaica artist, to design twenty four Torah mantle covers in anticipation of the 2026/5787 High Holidays. These new Torah covers will be designed specifically for HERJC with input from a congregational committee.

The goal is to have new mantles for all of our Torahs, both for the High Holiday season and for the remainder of the year. Families will have the opportunity to dedicate the Torah mantles to their loved ones. Our year-round Mitzvah 613 Torah will be dedicated to



the memory of Naomi and Norman Doctor and serve as a communal Torah for all members to dedicate toward. Any and all donation amounts are welcome to support the Doctor Torah mantle cover. Accordingly, we hope everyone in our community will support this meaningful campaign in whatever way works for your family.

In 2022, Jeanette was commissioned by the U.S. Postal Service to create the Hanukkah stamp. Jeanette specializes in glass, mosaic, metal, fiber art, calligraphy, papercutting, and painting. She makes Torah covers, Ark curtains, Donor Recognition Art, Huppot, Ketubot, Wall hangings and many other items for homes and institutions.

Each week, I watch our students arrive with bright smiles and eager energy. They can't wait to drop their coins into our Tzedakah box, counting them out with me in Hebrew. 




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




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
