The Story and Sound of Birkat Hamazon: A Journey Through Time and Tradition

Among the most familiar and beloved Jewish prayers, *Birkat Hamazon*—Grace After Meals, has a long and rich history that blends biblical roots, rabbinic development, and a rich musical tradition.

The origin of *Birkat Hamazon* lies in the Torah itself. In Deuteronomy 8:10, we read: "And you shall eat and be satisfied and bless the Lord

your God for the good land that God has given you." From this verse, our sages understood that giving thanks after a meal is not only a spiritual practice: it's a mitzvah from the Torah. Over time, the rabbis codified a series of four blessings: thanking God for sustenance, for the Land of Israel, for Jerusalem, and finally, for God's goodness and compassion. Later, additional insertions—such as those for Shabbat, holidays, or life events—were added to reflect the rhythm of Jewish life.

The Rabbi's Remarks

Receiving the Torah Anew: A Gift We Accept Again and Again

Shavuot is often called **Zman Matan Torateinu**, the time of the giving of our Torah. On that fateful day at Mount Sinai, God revealed the Divine will to our ancestors, binding us forever in an eternal covenant. But while the Torah was given at a specific time and place, the receiving of the Torah is an ongoing process—one that continues every time we

choose to bring God into our lives.

This idea is beautifully reflected in the blessings we recite before and after reading from the Torah. We don't say "asher natan," "who gave the Torah," in the past tense. Instead, we say "noten haTorah," "who gives the Torah," in the present tense. Why? Because each time we engage with the Torah, each time we stand in community and hear its words, we are not just recalling a distant event; we are experiencing Revelation all over again. The giving of the Torah is not a one-time occurrence. It happens whenever we open ourselves to its wisdom and allow it to shape our actions, our values, and our relationships.

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The Midrash teaches that the voice of God at Sinai did not echo (Shemot Rabbah 28:6). Why? Because an echo suggests that the sound diminishes over time. But God's voice, the voice of Torah, does not fade-it reverberates throughout the generations, ready to be heard and accepted by anyone willing to listen. Each time we study, pray, or engage with our community, we open ourselves to that voice once again.

Accepting the Torah through Our Actions

The act of receiving the Torah is not limited to moments of study or worship. We receive the Torah through the choices we make, the kindness we extend, and the values we embody. Each time we contribute our knowledge, our time, and our financial resources to strengthen our congregation, we affirm our covenant and ensure that the voice of Torah continues to resonate.

Pirkei Avot (1:2) teaches that the world stands on three pillars: Torah, Avodah, and Gemilut Chasadim: study, worship, and acts of loving-kindness. Our involvement in the life of HERJC reflects these pillars in meaningful ways:

- Torah: From the joyful beginnings in our Early Childhood Center (ECC), where our youngest children sing about Shabbat and learn the values of kindness and community, to the curiosity and growth fostered in our Religious School, where students develop a love for Jewish tradition and knowledge. And for those seeking deeper learning, our Adult Education programs offer thought-provoking classes that nourish the soul and engage the mind.
- Avodah: We feel God's presence through worship, whether it's in the quiet moments of reflection during our daily minyan, in the warmth of community at our monthly

A Musical Tradition

Like many Jewish prayers, *Birkat Hamazon* has been elevated by music. Different communities have developed their own melodies, from the rhythmic, sing-song tunes of Sephardic Jews to the spirited folk-like melodies used in Ashkenazi homes. In Conservative synagogues and summer camps, one particularly popular tune emerged in the 20th century—sometimes called the "camp melody"—a fast-paced, joyful rendition with call-and-response lines and clapping that encourages communal participation. This tune draws from Eastern European musical modes, with a tempo that reflects the celebratory mood after a shared meal. This camp melody is the one that we use at HERJC after Friday night dinners.

Shabbat in the Conservative Movement

In many Conservative synagogues and homes, *Birkat Hamazon* is an integral part of Shabbat meal gatherings. After a communal kiddush or Shabbat dinner, it's common to bench together, often led by a spirited songleader or the Hazzan. The practice reinforces the values of gratitude, community, and Shabbat joy. The inclusion of the *R'tzei* paragraph as well as *Shir Ha'ma'alot*—the special insertions for Shabbat—helps sanctify the day even further.

Whether sung quietly at home or loudly around a table of friends, *Birkat Hamazon* connects us to our ancestors, reminds us to be thankful, and brings melody into the rhythms of daily and sacred life. As we gather each Shabbat, may our voices rise in harmony, echoing the ancient commandment: *You shall eat and be satisfied and bless...*

A Word From the Ritual Committee

Shalom! One very meaningful ritual in our Jewish tradition is the lighting of yahrzeit candles to commemorate the death of a loved one on the Hebrew calendar anniversary of her/his/their passing. Lighting the candle is a way to remember and honor the memory of those who are no longer with us. The candles are lit at sundown on the eve of the yahrzeit. We also light them on Erev Yom Kippur, and on the evening of the last day of Sukkot, Pesach, and Shavuot—the three festival days that include the Yizkor service. If you ever need a yahrzeit candle, you can pick one up from the HERJC office. They are also available at many supermarkets in our area, and not just the Jewish ones.

Another ritual that can increase our individual connections to Judaism is putting on tefillin for daytime davening (tefillin is normatively worn for weekday shacharit, the morning prayer, but can be put on any time before sunset). HERJC hosted members of Temple Beth El on February 9 as we came together to not only put on tefillin and daven, but to learn more about tefillin from Rabbi Schlesinger and from Rabbi Kane from Beth El. We had great attendance and best of all, we were able to help students from our Religious School (some of whom were doing it for the very first time) learn how to put on tefillin. The students even helped to lead the service. A few adult women also put on tefillin for the very first time, fully embracing the opportunities that come from having an egalitarian synagogue such as HERJC. If you want to learn more about tefillin, please contact Rabbi Schlesinger.

As always, we'd love to see more people participating in leading services. Especially children and teenagers—it always brings a special feeling to the service when our youngest members contribute. It's also a great way to get our youth to feel comfortable in shul, which can help lead to a lifetime of commitment to Jewish practice. So please consider encouraging your children and grandchildren to participate on Shabbat, a holiday, or even a weekday minyan. There are so many opportunities to be on the bima—leading a prayer or a section of the service, doing one of our English readings, and of course, leading songs—not to mention chanting Torah blessings, reading Torah or Haftarah, or hagba and galila, all of which are perfect for post-B'nai Mitzvah.

We are still trying to update the name cards for honors at services so that everything goes smoothly when one of us is called for an honor on the bima. If you don't have a card, are not sure if you have a card, or need your card to be corrected or updated, you can enter your family's names on the HERJC website – look for the "HERJC Members Hebrew Name Project" button near the top of the homepage. You can also email or call the office with the correct information.

We hope that you enjoy the holidays of Yom Haatzma'ut, Lag b'Omer, Yom Yerushalayim, and Shavuot, and don't hesitate to reach out if you have any questions related to ritual.

GALA 2025 HONOREES: ALETA & ARIEL GRUNBERG



Aleta Grunberg was born and raised in eastern Pennsylvania in a small coal mining town which had a total of ten Jewish families. Her parents sent her to Hebrew school. They managed to keep kosher, traveling as far as NYC to do so. Aleta's father davened daily. As a result of her upbringing, and despite living in a predominantly Christian area, Aleta always loved and was extremely proud of being Jewish. She has a master's degree in elementary education and taught at Temple Emanuel (now Am Echad) in Lynbrook for twenty-five years.

Ariel Grunberg was born in Tel Aviv, and even though he left for Caracas, Venezuela at the age of three, his Zionist roots grew deep. His parents were not religious, but they instilled in him the love and respect he has for his homeland. When he was nine, his family moved to NYC. Ariel attended high school in London and has a Bachelor's degree in Business from Baruch College. He is partners with his brother in the real estate company founded by their parents.

Aleta and Ariel met in NYC in 1975. While visiting a friend in the city, Aleta went to listen to music at a bar. Ariel and his friend happened to have the same idea. So began their fairytale story. Ariel asked Aleta to dance and to this day they're still dancing.

Two things they both knew they wanted in a partner: that he/she be Jewish and that he/she loved to dance. It was *beshert* that they met. Besides, their Hebrew/Yiddish names are very similar: Ariel Moshe and Etel Mooshe. How could they not be a couple? They were married in 1977 and became the proud parents of Rebecca and Stephanie. In 1985, they moved from Queens to East Rockaway. Their aim was to live in a Jewish community within a good school district. They found both: Hewlett-East Rockaway Jewish Centre and Lynbrook School District.

Rebecca was in kindergarten when they moved. They immediately joined HERJC and enrolled Rebecca in Sunday School followed by Hebrew School. Stephanie also attended Sunday School and Hebrew School. Both were Bat Mitzvahed at HERJC. It was very important to have Rebecca and Stephanie immersed in Judaism outside their home. As a result, they, too, know the importance of instilling Jewish values in their children: Emma and Bar (Rebecca and Michael) and Avi and Eli (Stephanie and David).

Aleta was active in HERJC's Sisterhood (secretary for two years) until she became President of Waverly Park PTA and returned to the work force. Ariel was a member of the Men's Club. He served/serves on several HERJC committees: the committee to locate a synagogue in Israel to receive our no-longer-used Torah; the Israel Committee, and the Finance Committee.

Aleta and Ariel are also proud members of the Patrons Society. They have always loved attending the HERJC Galas to honor those being recognized and, of course, to dance. "Am Yisrael Chai" The people of Israel live! The Jewish people live! This was our theme this year. We integrated the theme into our programming throughout the year, bringing in Jewish entertainers for our membership dinner and comedy night, and Israeli speakers

for a few programs about Israel. We brought in programming from ADL, including a program about Anti-Israel Activism since October 7, as well as the Words to Action workshop for HERJC's high school students to help them to respond to antisemitism. We sponsored a presentation by the Jewish War Veterans of the U.S.A. and had a Jewish speaker about the history of Mah Jongg—a popular game amongst Jewish American Women. Together with Adult Ed, we had two movie nights, showing the documentary "A Tree of Life" about the 2018 Pittsburgh synagogue shootings and showing "A Wedding Plan," an entertaining Israeli film. At our Sisterhood Shabbat, our members read Torah, Haftorah, and English prayers, and in the D'var, I discussed the parallels between Parsha Va'era—when Pharoah would not let our people go—with the situation now when Hamas will not let the hostages go. We also had some programming just for the social aspect of doing things together. In addition to our membership dinner, comedy night, and bimonthly book club meetings, we enjoyed a game night and we're planning a Sisterhood Walk this spring. We're also adding

to our community services with a Spring Clean Out (clothing collection).







My favorite time of the week is Tuesday at 6:05 pm. At this time, our entire school gathers in the hallway for ten minutes. I engage with the students, asking them about what they've learned that day—covering topics from holidays to Hebrew—while trying to call on children from different classes. Each week, I pass the Israeli flag to a student who has correctly answered a question. This moment is always filled with pride—not just for the students, but

for the teachers and for me. I get to hear firsthand how the children are learning. Do they remember our Hebrew word of the week? Do they know which holiday is coming up next, or which one has just passed? Can they count in Hebrew? The pride grows even more when an older student hands the flag to a younger one who eagerly wants to hold it. And, of course, nothing compares to the pride I feel when I watch our students sing *Hatikvah*.

As I reflect on my first year at HERJC, I remind myself of the promise I made at the beginning: Every lesson, every activity, and every assignment must be taught with *kavanah*—intention. It's easy to move from one Torah story to another, from one holiday to the next, checking off highlights, completing a project, and moving on. But teaching with *kavanah* requires something deeper.

In a recent conversation, the Rabbi reminded me that my job is not about checking boxes. He emphasized that we shouldn't simply do things the way they've always been done just to mark them as "complete." This idea resonated with me. So many of us, in both our work and personal lives, move through tasks just to check them off a list. As a self-proclaimed "list person," I understand that satisfaction—

whether it's completing this *Hakol* article or managing my many Alexa lists for groceries, packing, and even my annual Pesach shopping. But Jewish education is not something that can be reduced to a checklist.

Our Shinshinit (Israeli gap-year representative), Tamar, often tells me how much more our HERJC students know compared to those at other congregations where she works. Our storyteller, Morah Debbie Cadel, frequently shares how insightful and knowledgeable our students are. Just this week, a teacher told me that her students had asked a question she didn't know the answer to—a moment of both challenge and pride, as it showed they were thinking deeply about our Passover traditions. And when I asked a **Building Blocks** student where his *kippah* was, and he pointed to his head and said, "On my *rosh*," I knew we were on the right path. Once again, teaching with intention—not just checking boxes.

Of course, along the way, there have been a few stumbles. But my goal has always been to lay the foundation for our students to continue their Jewish educational journey. I look forward to seeing our second graders receive their *Siddurim*, our Building Blocks graduates move on to *Kita Alef*, and our *Kita Zayin* students complete their Jewish education at HERJC and transition into active members of our congregation. I hope they will all continue their journeys with good deeds, kavod and Kayanah. —Morah Chari

JNF MISSION TO ISRAEL - ALETA AND ARIEL GRUNBERG



In February of this year, Aleta and Ariel Grunberg were on the first Jewish National Fund mission to Israel since October 7th, "The Housing and Development Fund Mission." Ariel is a member of the JNF Housing and Development Fund task force, which supports infrastructure building to help Kibbutzim and Moshavim in the north and south of Israel expand and, in some cases, survive. The mission visited several of these communities to see the difference JNF has made assisting the development of

areas in the north and the south (where today's pioneers are settling).

Along with the visiting of these communities, the mission visited the Nova Festival site, where they met a mother of an attendee who was murdered. She outlined the tragedy in great detail. They also traveled to Kiryat Shmona in the north. The residents had been evacuated due to Lebanon's brutal attacks. Slowly in February, the residents were returning. Some of the returnees relayed what ensued. The resilience of the Israelis is a dominant theme.

A second dominant theme is the willingness of the residents to help fellow countrymen, in this instance, by sharing their homes with evacuees (still common in February). An example is Halutza, which was visited by the Grunberg's group. It is a community in the south, less than a mile from the Gaza border. Luckily, it had not been attacked.

That mission was followed by Aleta and Ariel's volunteering with JNF in southern Israel abutting The Gaza Strip. There they helped pick delicious cherry tomatoes on a farm. The volunteers cleaned grounds of an evacuated kibbutz within this area. Most fortunately no one was harmed or taken hostage from this kibbutz. Shelters were painted and picnic tables built. The seventy-some volunteers baked desserts and made heroes. Both were delivered by the group to IDF soldiers serving in the Gaza Strip. Supplies were packed for the same IDF soldiers and also delivered.

The group was entertained by "The Special In Uniform" singers. The unit of special needs soldiers are made to feel worthy as they are a part of the IDF, performing necessary tasks outside the fighting zones. The base chef threw a BBQ in the volunteer group's honor. We danced and sang with soldiers serving in the Gaza area as the singers entertained. It was a remarkable send off to an amazing mission.

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
