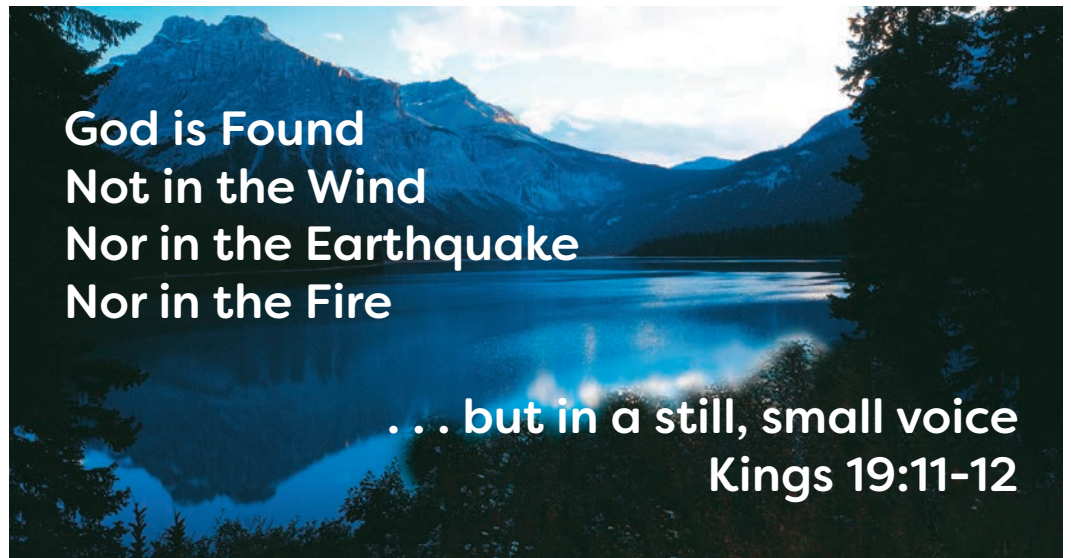
As we turn the corner from Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, and Simchat Torah, we enter the eighth Hebrew month of the calendar, Cheshvan. The root of the word Cheshvan is “chash” which means quiet or silence. This is the only month that has no holidays in it and therefore is seen as a recharging time after the build-up and drama of the High Holiday season.

Cheshvan teaches us to take time in the still moments, to reconnect with God on a personal level: One on One, Panim El Panim.

The Rabbi's Remarks

Jump In, The Water's Fine

In our 3,000-year history, Jews have been dubbed many things: the Chosen Ones, the People of the Book, and a light unto the world, to name a few. In each iteration, Jews represent ideals associated with humanity's progress, be it on a spiritual, educational, or cultural level. Yet how do we see ourselves as a people?

I would like to suggest that since Jews represent aspirational goals, we should take pride in our willingness and desire to act as a way of taking ownership of making a difference. By actively participating, we enrich the world around us. The Torah is replete with examples where God requires us to act as a matter of choice, rather than relying on others to represent our interests. Adam and Eve are given the *choice* of eating from the Tree of Knowledge. When the Ark is built, *each* Hebrew is asked to contribute one shekel to be counted among the population. When we say the *Shema*, we are *each* commanded to "teach these words to our children." And when Moses declares the final Commandment, the writing of a Torah is viewed as an act of self-declaration for *all* to follow. Indeed, the tradition of Chanukah is that Jews place their lighted Menorahs in their windows to offer light to the entire world rather than hiding it within the four walls of their homes. In essence, participation is at the core of being Jewish.

Today, HERJC is blessed to offer a multitude of ritual services and social events that bring us together as a community: from daily *minyan* to Shabbat morning services; from adult educational programs to Sisterhood-sponsored events; from the Progressive Dinner to Kabbalat Shabbat services and dinners. However, in the tradition of Jewish values, community requires an affirmative action by members to attend, register for, and otherwise *participate* so there will be meaning in what is available to members, preschool families, and guests alike.

It is said that when the Hebrews gathered at the Sea of Reeds to escape the onslaught of the oncoming Egyptian chariots, Moses' call for the waters to part was not sufficient by itself for God to grant Moses' command. Indeed, to affirm his faith, one Hebrew jumps into the whirling waters before the sea parts. Miracles often require active participation.

As we stand at the water's edge of HERJC's future, let us all become active participants in our destiny. Participating is in our collective DNA and need only be activated to help HERJC flourish further. Accordingly, I urge you to jump into any part of the water with relish and enthusiasm!

Thankfulness and Vigilance

As one of four siblings, lighting the Chanukah menorah when I was a boy reflected an ongoing compromise. Each of us lit a total of nine candles during the festival, so it was just a question of whether I would draw the first and last nights, the second and seventh nights, the third and sixth nights, or consecutive opportunities on the fourth and fifth nights. It never crossed my mind how life would be altered by my Mom's

Solomonic guidance had I one more sibling.

With age, my appreciation of Chanukah has moved away from the superficial comparisons with Christmas regarding the number of gift-giving nights and the lack of festive adornments. Instead, I've been drawn to a comparison between Chanukah and Thanksgiving, each commemorating an arduous time in which the fate of a people was at risk. Yet, unlike the help received from strangers in the Thanksgiving tale, Chanukah leaves Jews with the realization that cultural self-protection is as important as the miracle of survival. As such, for Jews, Chanukah adds the notion of vigilance to the concept of thankfulness that is apparent at the Thanksgiving table.

At HERJC, we have much to appreciate in this New Year: balanced budgets over the last two years; over 40 new family members added during that same time; a thriving preschool; successful fundraising activities enabling us to renovate the communal areas of our building and our childhood playground; a reenergizing of spirit among congregants that was palpable at our High Holiday services; and enthusiastic responses to the upcoming social events planned for the Fall. Still, Chanukah reminds us as Jews that fortunate times should be tempered by proactive planning.

On Rosh Hashanah, I announced the start of HERJC's most ambitious financial strategic plan in its history: the Etz Chaim Endowment Campaign aimed at raising \$2 million as a permanent lifeline for our future. To date, twelve families have pledged \$632,500 to begin this all-important initiative. In the months ahead, Rabbi Schlesinger and I will set up meetings with additional congregants to talk about their participation, and we encourage members to contact us if they wish to pledge their support at any level.

A great pleasure of this time in HERJC's history is reflecting on all that we should be thankful for, taking comfort from the positive trends our synagogue is experiencing. Our good fortune allows each member to enjoy the candles on HERJC's menorah. However, let us be vigilant as we ensure HERJC's future.

The Power of Candles and Light

The period of the High Holidays can often feel like a carousel that never seems to stop. By the time we reach Simchat Torah, there is a level of relief as the fall leaves shift from the canopy of the trees to the ground's surface, and we begin to shift from fall to winter. It is during Kislev, when the days are short, and the nights long, that we celebrate Chanukah, 25 Kislev (Sunday, December 18th) through 2 Tevet (Monday, December 26th).

Chanukah is a celebration commemorating the military victory of the Hasmoneans (the Maccabees), a *Jewish populist movement rejecting the assimilation movement undertaken by the Hellenists and the pressures of the Syrian-Greek Empire*, in 165 BCE. Once victorious, the Hasmoneans sought to rededicate the Temple through the lighting of the menorah. They had oil, but only enough to keep the flames burning for one night: it miraculously lasted eight days. In lighting the Hanukkiah, the Chanukah menorah, we remember these miracles and fill the darkness of the season with light.

The Sefat Emet, Rabbi Yehudah Aryeh Leib Alter, a 19th-century Polish Chassidic master, teaches the following:

At this time in the season, when lights are miraculously lit for Israel, even though they did not have enough oil, there remains light even now to help us, with the aid of these Chanukah candles, to find that hidden light within. Hiding takes place mainly in the dark; we need the candles' light to seek and find . . . by the power of inwardness, we can find the hidden light within our inner chambers. (1:198)

Not only does our lighting harken back to historical experience and memory, but it takes on an added layer of spiritual symbolism and significance. The candles are the light by which we seek out our inner selves. Rabbi Art Green teaches that "we are looking for the hidden divine light within ourselves; the mitzvot are light-seeking candles, instruments given to us to aid us in that search (P. 379, *The Language of Truth*)."

The nerot (candles) offers us a sacred opportunity to awaken those parts of ourselves we may have ignored or not been conscious of, and to uplift and bring them into practice.

The holiday of lights (Chanukah) is also discussed prominently in our greatest literary source, the Talmud. The ancient rabbis teach that when the first being, Adam, encountered the changing of the seasons as the days increasingly grew in darkness, he panicked and cried out: "Woe is me! Perhaps because I sinned, the world is becoming dark around me and will return to the [primordial state] of chaos and disorder". When the spring came, and the darkness passed, he realized that this was merely the way of the world. In celebration, Adam established an eight-day festival for himself and future generations to commemorate the return of the light (Avodah Zara 8a)

Might Chanukah become a story of the essential need we hold to believe that even in the darkest of times, the light will return?

The various tales of Chanukah bring to mind the tensions we, as modern Jews, find ourselves in, pulls of the particular and universal. Chanukah reminds us of universal truths as well as those uniquely individual. May the act of lighting our candles serve as a practice through which we can better understand our own unique lights and enlighten the darkness of the natural cycle and rhythms of the season.

THE HIDDEN STAR OF THE SERTAO

Introduction by Juliana Portenoy Schlesinger

***The Hidden Star of the Sertao* is a Brazilian film which examines the culture of these crypto-Jews.**

In the Sertao, the Northeast region of Brazil, there are people who are nominally Catholic who nevertheless follow many Jewish traditions such as circumcision or lighting candles on Friday night. Where did these people come from? Are they Jews in hiding? Do they need to convert in order to be considered “real” Jews?



Arthur Mintz (z”l) wrote this powerful article in April, 1983 about his experiences as a young Jewish soldier in the Army.



There was an important turning point in my life – both as an individual and as a Jew. In November, 1966 I reported to the Reception Center, U.S. Army Infantry School at Fort Dix, New Jersey.

“Reception” took on a new meaning during my first seven days in the U.S. Army. It included haircuts, uniforms, medical exams and a new way of life. I became part of a vast machine.

Reception even meant religious orientation. My training company of 200 men assembled and the Drill Sergeant asked the Protestants, Baptists and Catholics to fall out into smaller groups and proceed to their churches. He also instructed the atheists to remain in the barracks until the others returned. Then instead of directing the Jews to the Synagogue, the Sergeant turned and casually remarked that the three remaining recruits “will be taken to the showers.” Mintz, Rubell and Tannenhauser wondered if we were really hearing this.

I wondered why we had been singled out by the Sergeant's obvious slur. What difference did it matter whether I was a Jew? I was there to be trained as a soldier with thousands of other young men from all over America. This was 1966, or was 21 years old, just out of college and scared.

After the base Rabbi had instructed all Jewish recruits on their religious rights, Friday evenings and Saturday mornings became our time to gather with the other Jewish personnel on the base. Although I never had to face an enemy who would fire a gun at me, there always seemed to be an adversary trying to deny my right to observe my faith. When I returned home, there was a new awareness within me of my heritage. There was also a responsibility to support other Jews who would need my help to observe their faith. These motivations have remained with me throughout my adult life.

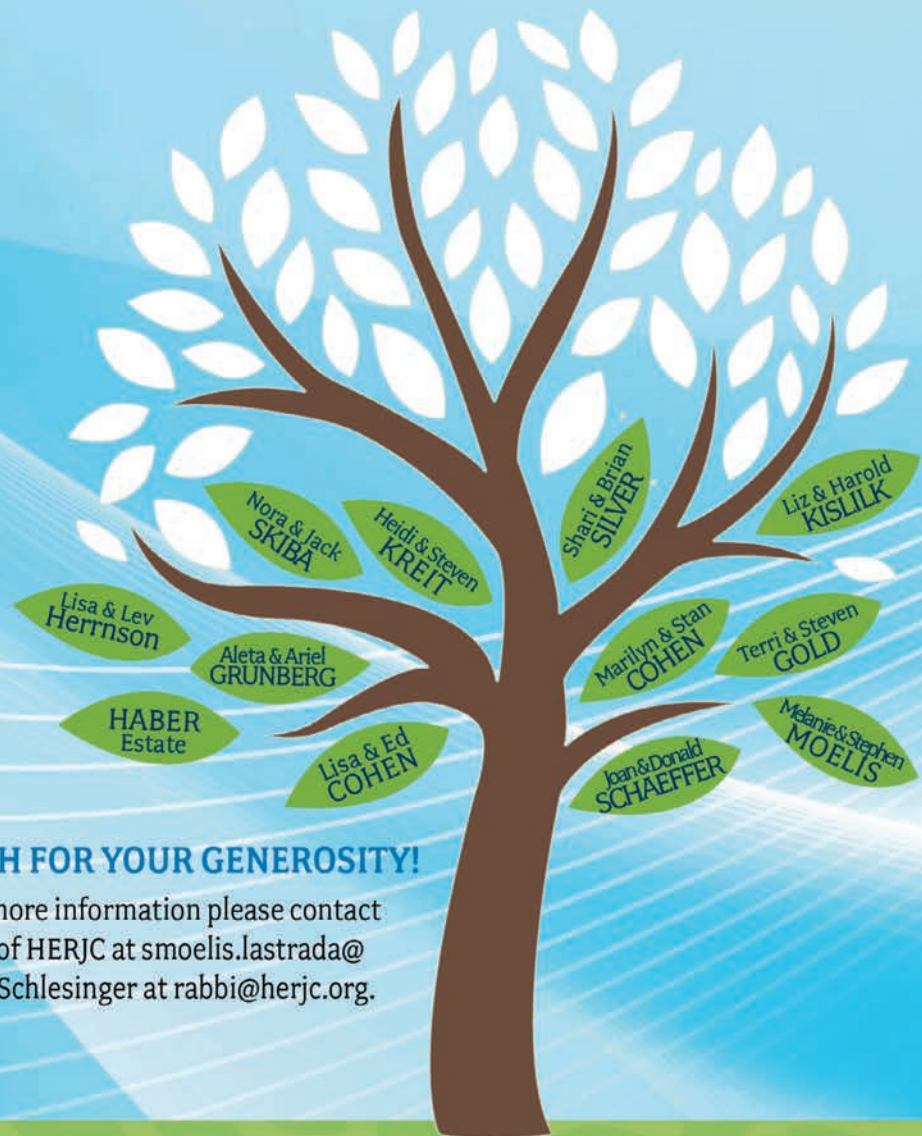

THE LIGHTING OF CHANUKAH CANDLES

The celebration of Chanukah begins on the twenty-fifth day of the Hebrew month of Kislev. On this day, a small group of Maccabean soldiers were victorious over the great Greek army, and the desecrated Temple was rededicated to the service of God. We light candles for eight days, beginning on the evening of December 2, in commemoration of the famous miracle of the oil. After the Maccabean victory, one single crucible of oil (enough to light the Temple Menorah for only one day) was found. Miraculously, however, it lasted for eight days, long enough for new consecrated oil to be prepared.

The Chanukah menorah (Chanukia) has nine candles, eight of which represent the eight days of Chanukah. The ninth candle, the Shamash, is used to light the other candles and usually towers above the rest or is separate from them.

The Chanukah lights may be lit by any member of the family. In some families, each member lights his or her own Chanukia.

ORDER OF LIGHTING THE CHANUKAH CANDLES

The candles are placed from right to left, as one faces the Chanukia (as Hebrew is read). But they are lit from left to right, so that on each night, the new candle is given special welcome by being lit first. Only the Shamash is used to light the other candles.

The candles should be lit as soon as possible once it is dark. On Friday night, however, the Chanukah candles are lit BEFORE the Shabbat candles. At the close of Shabbat, the Havdalah ceremony precedes the lighting of the Chanukia.

Mini Olive Oil Cakes with Lemon Glaze

Ingredients For the Cakes

- 1 tbsp. unsalted butter, melted (or margarine to make pareve)
- 1 cup all-purpose flour, plus more for dusting
- 1-1/3 cups granulated sugar
- 2 tbsp grated lemon zest (from 2 lemons)
- 2 large eggs
- 1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil
- 2/3 cup whole milk (or non dairy milk to make pareve)
- 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 tsp finely minced fresh thyme, plus sprigs for garnish

Ingredients For the Glaze

- 1 1/2 cups confectioners' sugar
- 2 1/2 to 3 tablespoons lemon juice (from 1 to 2 lemons)
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted (or margarine to make pareve)

Directions

1. Position a rack in the middle of the oven; preheat to 350 degrees. Prepare the cakes: Brush a 6- or 12-cup mini Bundt or muffin pan with the melted butter. Lightly dust with flour and shake out the excess.

2. Pulse the granulated sugar and lemon zest in a blender until combined. Add the eggs one at a time, then gradually pour in the olive oil and milk, pulsing until emulsified into a thin batter, about 30 seconds. Don't overblend or the cakes will be too puffy.

3. Whisk 1 cup flour, the baking powder, salt and 1 teaspoon thyme in a small bowl. Add to the blender in 2 batches, pulsing lightly until just combined; stop to scrape down the sides of the blender as needed. Pour the batter into the prepared pan. Bake until the cakes just begin to pull away from the sides of the

pan and spring back when lightly touched, 28 to 30 minutes for a 6-cup Bundt pan and 22 to 25 minutes for a 12-cup Bundt or muffin pan. Cool in the pan for 10 minutes, then loosen the sides with a small knife and invert the cakes onto a rack.

4. Meanwhile, prepare the glaze: Whisk the confectioners' sugar, lemon juice and butter until smooth, adding more lemon juice if the mixture is too thick. Drizzle over the warm cakes and garnish with thyme sprigs.

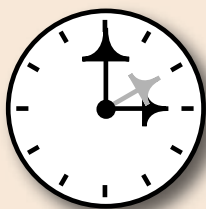

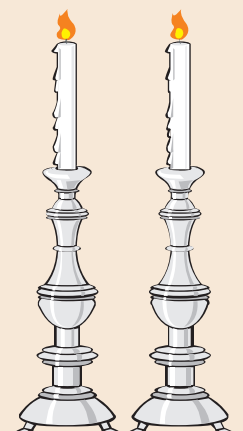

Many years ago when I went to Israel with my staff, I was fortunate to visit a day care center on a kibbutz and speak with many Israeli children along our journey. I was quite impressed with the

sense of independence and self-confidence that the children exhibited in their actions and dialogue. As a parent, teacher, and director, I am always in the position of encouraging children to become autonomous. Many parents have come to me for help in this difficult task.

The hardest job for parents is to restrain themselves when they see their children make mistakes or struggle with a problem. Teachers and parents so enjoy the feeling of being needed, but all too often this feeling interferes with children making their own decisions and learning from the outcome.

Somehow, our children's failures become our failures as well. When my own children ask me "Mom, what do you think I should do?" I have to bite my tongue to keep from responding with the words I'm certain will make the situation all better.

Parents also contribute to their child's dependence by doing everything for them. In the parent's busy schedule, it is much more convenient to button their child's button, tie their shoes, wipe up the spilled milk, and solve their social problems. It has been said that when one person is dependent upon another, feelings of helplessness, worthlessness, resentment, frustration and anger can arise. Happily, there are many opportunities that come up daily to encourage children's autonomy:

1. Let children make choices: For example, allow your child to decide whether he wants to wear a red shirt or a green shirt or eat cereal or eggs for breakfast, etc.
2. Show respect for a child's struggle-when a child tries to zip his or her own coat, instead of saying "Here, let me

do it," say "Zippering takes a lot of funny finger work."

3. Try not to ask too many questions. It always amazes me the number of questions parents of pre-school children barrage their children with when the classroom door is opened at the end of school day: "Did you have fun today?" "Did you paint?" "Did you share the pretzels with the class?" "Whom did you play with?" "Were you a good boy/girl today?" My advice to parents when they greet their child at the end of school is simply to say "I'm happy to see you!"
4. Don't rush to answer questions. A younger child loves to ask questions. For example, "Daddy, where does snow come from?" One can simply answer "Where do you think it comes from?"
5. Don't take away hope! Adele Faber, author of "How To Talk So Kids Will Listen And Listen So Kids Will Talk" said "By trying to protect children from disappointment, we protect them from hoping, striving, dreaming and sometimes, from achieving their dreams."

It's a bittersweet road we travel. We start with total commitment to a small, helpless human being. Over the years we worry, plan, comfort, and try to understand. We give our love, our labor, our knowledge, and our experience-so that one day he or she will have the inner strength and confidence to leave us. Let's allow children longer periods of time to figure things out and show them we have confidence in their journey to do so.
