### **Just Showing Up**

There is a famous saying that eighty percent of success in life is just showing up. These are truly words to live by. Of course, there isn't even a possibility of making our way down the road to success (however you personally define that term) if we don't show up and take our first step forward. Inertia and indifference can weigh us down, but all of us must make the effort to "show up." Most people associate this saying with what comes next, meaning that once you show up, you have opened the door to numerous opportunities which, if pursued, may lead to success. I suggest to you that just offering your presence,

in many aspects of life, is in and of itself meaningful and that often, it is what matters most.

There is a tradition in Judaism that when one enters a shiva home to pay respect to those in mourning, a person should largely remain silent and not speak until the mourner does. This drives home the point that it is simply one's presence that matters. One is not there for the purpose of lifting anyone's spirits or perhaps providing a momentary distraction from

pain. The purpose of visiting those in mourning is to remind them that they are not alone and that there exists a community of people with whom they are interconnected and can rely upon. The mourner will naturally indicate a preference for silence or conversation and in your presence will make those needs known. By simply being there, you have fulfilled your sole responsibility with an act of loving-kindness.

There are many other times in people's lives during which just showing up makes all the difference in the world. Times of divorce, financial stress, physical or mental health struggles are just a few examples. Some may choose to avoid what could be uncom-

fortable or even distressing situations, but those who choose to be present provide immeasurable comfort to those in need.

Similarly, just showing up for *minyan* can mean so much to so many and all that is required is your presence. A Jew doesn't need to know how to *daven Shachrit*, when to sit or stand, bow or sway in order to make *minyan*. They just need

to be there. One of the biggest sources of pride (and signs of health/longevity) is a congregation has is its ability to say: "We have a regular minyan." Providing someone with the ability to say *Kaddish* or the ability to say prayers that are important and meaningful to them by making a *minyan* is such a beautiful and selfless act, and all it requires is your presence.

So many of us will be attending services on the High Holidays to declare our faith, observe tradition, demonstrate unity, or for many other reasons. Our halls will be filled with people wishing each other well, commenting on how big our children and/or grandchildren are becoming, how wonderful and inspiring the Rabbi's sermons are, etc. We will be filled with a sense of pride that our congregation is growing and thriving.

HERJC's clergy, staff, volunteers, and members have all been working hard to create the growth, warmth, and vibrancy that will be on display during the High Holidays. As your new President, I ask that when the High Holidays are over and life quiets down again, you remember the importance of showing up: showing up for each other, as individuals, as a community, and as Jews. I encourage all of you to attend even more special events and take advantage of all the opportunities for spiritual and personal growth that HERJC provides. Perhaps most of all, remember that offering your presence at a Kabbalat Shabbat in mid-July or a minyan during the middle of the week is such a *mitzvah* and means so much to HERJC's present and future.

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# **High Holidays**



The origins of Rosh Hashanah may be sought in a royal enthronement ritual from biblical times, though the Bible itself never mentions the "New Year" or "Day of Judgment" aspects of the holiday. Even though Rosh Hashanah falls in the seventh month, later rabbinic tradition decided to designate it the beginning of the year. Although the origin of this tradition may have been adopted from the Babylonians, the rabbis imbued it with Jewish significance as the anniversary of the day on which the world was created, or of the day on which humanity was created. Another explanation can be found in the significance of Tishrei as the seventh month, hence the Sabbath of the year. (www.myjewishlearning.com)

#### The HERJC Neilah Tradition

The last service of Yom Kippur is called Neilah, the "Service of the Closing of the Gates." As twilight fell on Biblical Jerusalem, the gates of the Temple were closed. Neilah signals the end of the period of repentance and we are reminded to enter the Gates of Repentance before it is too late. Congregants are invited to come up on the Bima for a short, personal prayer while the Ark is open. The service ends with one mighty blast of the Shofar. Bring your Shofar and join us.

We close the HERJC parking lot during the High Holy Days to maintain the dignity of our worship. If you park on the side streets, please be considerate and do not disturb our neighbors. to proudly declare that the Jewish people will survive. It's a scary time now... Israel is fighting terrorists to defend its right to exist and antisemitism is growing in the United States and around the world. How do we survive as a Jewish people? We need to instill a love of Judaism in our families, we need to participate in Jewish activities, we need to educate ourselves about Judaism and Jewish history so we can speak up, and we need to support Jewish organizations.

HERJC Sisterhood has adopted *Am Yisrael Chai* as our theme this year. The Jewish people live! We stand strong as members of the Jewish community. Sisterhood members work together to coordinate activities at HERJC, growing our friendships as we work together. We sponsor programs, Kiddush, meals, and holiday treats, support our youth program and religious school, and send holiday gifts to our children who are away at college. In addition, Sisterhood welcomes new HERJC members with a Shabbat gift soon after they join.

Sisterhood is sponsoring HERJC's partnership in the ADL Signature Synagogue Program, to bring ADL speakers to keep us informed about world events impacting the Jewish people. We held an event on May 30 with David White from ADL discussing their efforts in "Combating Campus Antisemitism" and what communities can do to support those efforts. We've also made arrangements to offer ADL's Words to Action® program to our high school and college youth, to help them increase their understanding and ability to address antisemitism.

We kick off the year's activities with a book talk with Dorit Sasson. Author of *Sand and Steel: A Memoir of* 

Longing and Finding Home, Sasson will discuss her journey to understanding what it means to exist in two worlds and her quest to find home. A native New Yorker who moved to Israel to serve in the IDF, she and her Israeli husband were confronted with the reality of economic depression in Israel after the second Israeli-Lebanese war, and moved to Squirrel Hill, PA in search of a better future (where they lived at the time of the attack on the Tree of Life synagogue). Join us for an enlightening discussion about Sasson's experience, and Israeli and American Jewish culture, on Sept. 18 at 8:00 pm. If you'd like to borrow a copy of the book to read before the event, contact me.

Sisterhood activities help strengthen the Jewish community at HERJC during the High Holidays. On October 21, we'll gather for our annual Sweets in the Sukkah event in the Hazzan's sukkah and we'll share stories about our Ushpizot, "spiritual guests" who represent our theme. Sisterhood women will again enhance the holiday spirit by decorating the *bima* and sukkah for Sukkot. Finishing out the High Holidays, Sisterhood will again provide jelly apples, chocolate covered and plain apples during the Simchat Torah celebration.

The Jewish people are called the People of the Book. While the term refers to our connection with the Torah, our Sisterhood Book Club also enjoys connecting with books. We meet every other month to discuss a book and share ideas. Our next book club meeting will be on October 29.

Tikkun Olam, repairing the world, is a strong tradition of the Jewish people. Sisterhood helps those in our community who are less fortunate than we are. We collect nonperishable food during the week before Yom Kippur during our Kol Nidre food drive and we continue to collect food throughout the year. In addition, we have an annual coat drive, which will take place this year on November 3 and 4.

We thank everyone for standing with Israel and participating in sending wishes for a Good Year to our HERJC friends and family. We're praying for a good year for Israel and the Jewish people. *Am Yisrael Chai!*

### Welcome Back to School

I hope all of you had a wonderful summer. We are so excited to welcome your children back to school to get ready to climb up the next step of their

educational ladder. And how do we do this? >> We Play!! We learn through play!

*Scene:* You are given a book about the periodic table of elements and told to read it. You do, because that is what is expected of you. Will you remember any of that book in a few months? Chances are, you won't, unless you LOVE the periodic table of elements and have taken interest in it. Maybe this sounds similar to experiences you had in school. On the other hand, is there something you have wanted to learn how to do recently? Maybe it was changing a spark plug in your car or sewing a cute bib for your best friend's baby. I bet you learned pretty quickly and probably enjoyed what you were doing. Maybe you felt a sense of accomplishment because you picked this skill up on your own. There is a lesson here:

### **Play IS learning**

Play is often seen as a break from learning. It is seen as the reward for working hard. But in reality, the best learning happens through play. Play can be defined as an activity that is self-chosen and self-directed, where the player can choose to stop when they are done. Real, true play does not start with a teacher or an adult; it starts and ends with the child. Allow your children time to interact with the environment around them. They will discover, inquire, and create accordingly.

### Here is the point . . .

When we are interested in something, we pick it up very easily. When we are motivated out of necessity, we learn things. The same is true for children. When your child loses an art project because their name wasn't on it, they will pick up a crayon and write their name on the next one. If their block tower topples over because the base wasn't large enough, they will learn through trial and error how to make it tall and sturdy. Your child is learning all day long. ALL DAY. And they don't need a teacher sitting in front of them teaching AT them in order for learning to happen.

We are your child's guides. We ask open-ended questions to get the brain thinking. We offer suggestions in subtle ways to make connections to what your child already knows. We set the stage for learning through a carefully planned-out environment filled with open-ended materials. When your child is interested in something, we notice and plan accordingly!

Trust your child. Trust brain research. Trust the teachers. Play is the way!

Welcome back to school! Let's get ready to play!!

#### Notes on Jewish Music: The Call of the Shofar

August 28, 1977

One of the oldest musical instruments is the Shofar. After the destruction of the Temple the rabbis decreed that no musical instrument should again be used during the service, except for one, the Shofar, and that to be used only on Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur.

The Shofar, a ram's horn – why the horn of a ram? Ask your children if they know. (A ram's horn is specifically selected on Rosh Hashana in order to call to mind the Akeda, the binding of Isaac, when Abraham offered up a ram in place of his son.)

Three different sounds or blasts are blown on the Shofar. The "Tekia" is a long, steady blast. The "Shevarim" is a wavering, sobbing sound representing three shorter blasts. The "Terua" is a series of nine short, staccato blasts that have been compared to the wailing of someone in distress. The Rosh Hashana service includes a total of 100 sounds executed according to a particular scheme. Rabbinic authority does not stress the exact pitch, timbre or intensity of the "Tekia". All sounds produced by the Shofar are acceptable, that is "kosher," however, the duration of each unit of sound is prescribed by law. The "Baal Tekia," the Shofar blower, must hold each set of notes the identical length of time. For example, if his "Tekia" is nine seconds, then his "Shevarim" (three notes) must take nine seconds inclusively, and his "Terua" (nine short blasts) must each take one second, so that nine seconds in all has elapsed.

The first time the Shofar is heard is on the morning of Rosh Hashana. The blower precedes the ceremony with a blessing in which he gives thanks to God for having sanctified us with the commandment to hear the voice of the Shofar. The melody he uses (in the Ashkenasic tradition) is itself an imitation of a trumpet call. Then the cantor or the rabbi pronounces that the ancient names of the calls one by one and the blower sounds them. After they have all been sounded, the congregation sings a passage from the prayer book in joyous response at having heard their ancient rallying cry once more. The last time we blow the Shofar is at the end of the Yom Kippur service – one long blast – "Tekia gedola," when we recite the heartfelt clarion call Le'Shana Haba B'Yirushalim, next year in Jerusalem. Maybe, just maybe, "this" year will be the "next".
